The bad news looking ahead is that this will not change much with the turn of the calendar page. Case numbers in the weeks around Christmas were near or above the highest levels of the pandemic at both local, state, and national levels. This will most likely mean a spike in deaths throughout the first month of the new year. Vaccines have now become available, but are in very limited supply and facing serious distribution challenges. We have kept giving at a high level despite the economic challenges this year has brought. In fact, we have increased our giving to the larger Disciples church and the important work that they support by beginning to implement a series of special holiday offerings. We have not only met our outreach expectations but doubled them. It is here that I have to embarrass Ruby Mae Oakes a little bit because she is the major reason for this as she has been making and selling masks throughout the year and donating the proceeds towards this endeavor. We have continued to support the backpack program with Snow Creek Elementary School despite the challenges that they have faced with many students not in the building. I have seen countless examples of members of the church caring for their fellow members and other neighbors throughout all of the disruptions. We have done all of this without the shouting and name-calling that have been highlighted in so many other areas of society. Snow Creek may not have thrived in 2020, but we have done much more than just barely survive. There has already been a lot of really good news.


And 2021 looks like a year where we can expect


Food was also provided for all 46 children until they return to school on Jan. 4th.






In Memory of

William Carlton Oakes

William Carlton Oakes, age 94, passed away on Sunday, December 6, 2020, at his home in Snow Creek with his family by his side. He was born in Pittsylvania County, on July 8, 1926, to the late Tasville Carr and Lula Yeatts Oakes. He had 12 brothers and sisters who all preceded him in death; brothers, Charlie, Henry, Eugene, Kelly, Curtis, and Letcher, Leslie; sisters, Eva Parsons, Cordie Parsons, Lila Farthing, Gladys Reynolds, and Bernice Oakes; and granddaughter, Laura Cabell Oakes.

Surviving are his loving wife of 72 years, Bernice Eggleston Oakes; son, Gerald Carlton (Anne) Oakes; daughters, Joyce (Jim) Thompson, and Cynthia (Ricki) Oakes; grandsons, Adam and Brian (Maia) Thompson; and the light of his life, greatgrandson, Avery Carlton Thompson; sister-in-law, Ruby Mae Oakes; numerous nieces and nephews; and two "just like" daughters, Donna and Mollie.



Carlton was devoted to his family and was a beloved neighbor, and, at age 94, was the oldest member of the Snow Creek community. He was also a member of the Snow Creek Christian Church. Carlton started his life farming with his father and brothers. He left the farm for factory work and wound up working at DuPont in Martinsville for 33 years before retiring in 1985. Carlton was a veteran and served in the Navy during World War II aboard the USS William R. Rush. Carlton loved hunting and stock car racing. He also loved building things and was a real handyman who was always willing to help others. He built his own house in Snow Creek where he lived from 1955 until his death.

Carlton was blessed to be able to stay in his family home with his wife Bernice due to the devoted care of his daughter Cynthia and her husband, Ricki.

Due to the pandemic, funeral services will be private. In lieu of flowers, donations may be made to the Snow Creek Rescue Squad or the Snow Creek Fire Department.

Carlton was a longtime valued resident of the Snow Creek Community and member of our Church.

He was the last sibling of a large family that loved him very much. Carlton was very proud of his military service. He loved to talk to Del (another Navy Veteran) about his time in the Navy.

Bernice and Carlton were always so pleasant and friendly at Church. In recent years, I would

They had great stories to tell and were a pleasure to be around.

On a personal note: In recent years, Carlton would talk to me about how he liked to spend time talking with my Dad at work at Dupont and how much he thought of him. These conversations meant a lot to me.
